Byrne Justice Assistance Grant Opportunity

REQUESTED ACTION:

We request permission to apply for and enter into an MOU with Crook County to received Byrne JAG monies. The application must be approved by City Council and the MOU must be signed by the CEOs of both Crook County and the City of Prineville.

BACKGROUND:

For several years, the City of Prineville has received Byrne Grant monies. These monies can be spent to further law enforcement purposes. Typically, these monies have been in small amounts (around \$10,000) and we have used the monies to complete small projects, like Information Technology upgrades or for the purchase of equipment. Additionally, we have entered into cooperative agreements with Crook County Sheriffs Office in at least the three last grant cycles on how to best spend the money. As we have in years past, we are not opposed to working cooperatively with CCSO on projects that further the mission of law enforcement in this area.

This year, we are slated to receive \$80,260 and Crook County is to receive a little over \$25,000. The increase is due to Stimulus package increases and may very well be a one-time increase. There is no match and the monies can be spent over the next four years.

As staff we met to discuss how to spend the monies. We agreed that we should first look to pressing technology needs, then to officer safety equipment, then equipment or items that reduce liability and improve our ability to investigate. Some of these areas will benefit all area law enforcement and case prosecution. The prices listed for the items are estimates and we hope to leverage our buying power through bulk purchases.
